



Dear Parents of Rising Second Graders,

Happy Summer! Congratulations on your child's successful completion of first grade. We hope your family enjoys a restful and fun-filled break. While summer is a time for play, exploration, and making memories, it's also important to keep young minds active and engaged. To support your child's continued learning, we're offering a few suggestions for reading and math enrichment.

Reading:

We encourage daily reading or listening to stories. Please see the attached list of recommended titles. Of course, your child is welcome to explore any books that spark interest. Two BINGO boards are included to check off as your child reads this summer. The goal is to fill in at least three rows per board. Any completed BINGO boards should be returned to their new second-grade teachers on the first day of school. There is also a grammar sheet attached to review sentence writing skills.

Math:

To reinforce first-grade skills and prepare for second grade, your child may practice...

- addition and subtraction facts within 20
- identifying and counting coins and dollar bills
- telling time/clock practice

Some engaging apps that provide excellent practice include the following:

- **Moose Math, SplashLearn, ZapZap Math, Peter Pig's Money Counter, Math Doodles**

At LCCDS, we learn Spanish through stories, music, and games throughout the year. I hope we can continue the fun over the summer so we don't forget all we have learned. A few of my favorite ways to practice my Spanish at home are listed below.

- **Play Games - There are many gaming sites** available, but my favorite is Duolingo. Duolingo is a free app that allows users to practice new language skills in a fun, effective, and highly customized manner. Students complete mini-lessons, answer questions, translate, and more. The program assesses your language ability, and the lessons change to match it. Fabulngua has a free trial and is a story-based learning game. The Canticos app is also a free app that is great for younger learners that is bilingual with music, stories, and games.
- **Listen -** Podcasts are a great way to have students hear the language. A great one for beginners is “¡Cuéntame! Learn Spanish with Comprehensible Input” by Marta Ruiz Yedinak, which is the closest to how LCCDS teaches, using acquisition-driven learning. Another great option is the “Garbanzo Spanish podcast”; others include “Eat Your Spanish: A Spanish Learning Podcast for Kids and Families!” by Evan Blum. For our intermediate Spanish speakers, there is “Spanish Stories for Kids.” Both of these podcasts are available anywhere you get your podcasts on Apple or Android.
- **Watch TV-** No, I am not joking! We learn Spanish by acquiring it the same way we acquired our first language. TV shows that interest students are a great way to hear the language and see it in context. There are many stories and cartoons on streaming sites in Spanish to discover. My favorite way to watch Spanish shows is to find something I already enjoy and set the subtitles and audio to Spanish. Many streaming services also have a feature to slow down the audio so that it can be slower and easier to understand.
- **Additional Resources-** spanishplayground.net has a plethora of comprehensible videos on their website. Rockalingua has a few free music, stories, and games, but it is a paid service.

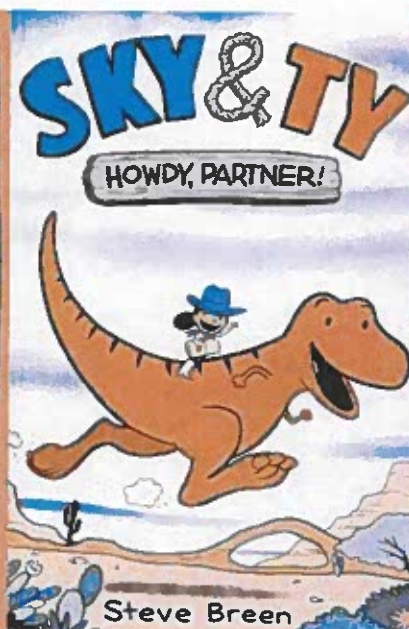
