Go to <u>clever.com</u> as a student > click "Log in with Google" > choose your account or click "use another account" > your username is your email address: your first name, last initial@lccdayschool.com > contact office if you don't know password > click sign-in > you are in Clever > find and click on IXL > be sure your name is in the top right corner > click "Learning" at the top bar > scroll down to IXL plans > click on IXL summer boost: math or language arts > click 2nd grade > begin practicing! > You are finished working on the skill when you reach a SmartScore of 80. Please stop after 80 if it is causing frustration.

At LCCDS we learn Spanish through stories, music, and games throughout the year. I hope we can continue the fun over the summer so we don't forget all we have learned. A few of my favorite ways to practice my Spanish at home are listed below.

- Play Games- There are many sites for games available but my favorite is
 Duolingo. Duolingo is a free app that allows users to practice new language
 skills in a fun, effective, and highly customized manner. Students complete
 mini-lessons, answer questions, translate, and more. The program assesses
 your language ability, and the lessons change to match it. Canticos app is
 also a free app that is great for younger learners that is bilingual with music,
 stories, and games.
- Listen Podcasts are a great way to have students hear the language. A great one for beginners is "¡Cuéntame! Learn Spanish with Comprehensible Input" by Marta Ruiz Yedinak, which is the closest to how LCCDS teaches, using acquisition-driven learning. Another great option is the "Garbanzo Spanish podcast", others include "Eat Your Spanish: A Spanish Learning Podcast for Kids and Families!" By: Evan Blum. For our intermediate Spanish speakers, there is "Spanish Stories for Kids". Both of these podcasts are available anywhere you get your podcasts on Apple or Android.
- Watch TV- No I am not joking! We learn Spanish by acquiring it the same way we acquired our first language. TV shows that interest students are a great way to hear the language and see it in context. There are many stories and cartoons on YouTube, Hulu, HBO, and other streaming sites in Spanish to discover. My favorite way to watch Spanish shows is to find something I already enjoy and set the subtitles and audio to Spanish. Netflix and YouTube also have a feature to slow down the audio so that it can be slower and easier to understand.
- Additional Resources- spanishplayground.net has a plethora of comprehensible videos on YouTube. Rockalingua has a few free music, stories, and games but it is a paid service.
